Whether you're teaching, leading a service, or responding to students' questions, our work will help you help students to listen well, thoughtfully consider, and respond constructively to issues in the world around them.


Drawing on Harvard's Thinking

# FOR THE LOVE OF GOD

## Would the world be better off without religion?

In 2008, CPX was involved behind-the-scenes in a debate on this topic. The affirmative won by an overwhelming majority, which got us thinking: truly, what contributions have religion and religious people made to the world? Are they good or bad? Where does Christianity sit in the mix? And why are the bad stories so much better-known than the good ones?

For the Love of God: How the church is better and worse than you ever imagined is the result of these questions: a documentary that confronts the worst that Christians have done, and traces the origins of Western values like human rights, charity, and non-violence back to the influence of Jesus.

These accompanying resources, produced in partnership with Australian teachers, contain suggested activities for use in high-school classrooms, based on one or more of the documentary's segments. Click on any topic below to see these segments, which range from one to fifteen minutes in length.



### BITES ON THE BIBLE


The Bible is the most popular book on earth. But despite its popularity, it remains incredibly misunderstood. This series of short videos answers seven commonly-asked questions about the book we *think* we know.

The speaker, **Dr Darrell Bock**, is Executive Director of Cultural Engagement and Senior Research Professor of New Testament Studies at Dallas Theological Seminary. He is the author of over 40 books, including notable commentaries on the biblical books of Luke and Acts, and several works looking at the historical Jesus. He often speaks in the media on topics related to the New Testament and Christianity in contemporary society.


## BIG QUESTIONS
